


What is Dual Credit?



Dual Credit means earning **both** high school and college credit for the **same** work at the **same time!**

No additional work or tests!
The grade you earn will be on both transcripts.









WHAT IS RUNNING START?

Enroll as an SVC college student early, and earn college credit and complete high school graduation requirements at the same time for the same work!

Running Start is a **set of state statutes**that creates agreements between
high schools and community colleges
and is your source of **state funding for tuition**.

IMPORTANT TO KNOW:

Running Start is **not a special set of courses at SVC** or a special program on campus. Running Start students are in courses with the rest of the population of students (avg. age 29) and are considered SVC students.

SVC does not offer the same level of institutional parent/guardian involvement the high school (this is true even though students are minors).

Running Start is **not completely free**, there are costs students will incur.

Running Start is a great way to earn two types of credit for the same work, start college early, and fund tuition!



RUNNING START ELIGIBILTY

- Must be enrolled in a public school district (homeschool and private school students must enroll in their local public school to participate)
- Must be under the age of 21 as of Sep 1st of the school year of enrollment
- Students must be classified as juniors or seniors by the public high school
- Students can <u>not</u> have achieved all of their <u>high school graduation</u>
 <u>requirements</u> (or be graduated from high school or have earned a GED)

What are the benefits of Running Start?

SAVE A LOT OF MONEY AND TIME!



You save \$11,122.20 on 90 SVC credits!

The <u>same credits</u> at UW would be **\$34,560** in tuition alone!

You can earn an employable degree by the time you're 18!

This means you have a head start on a great paycheck!

Get to where you're going faster!

Agreement degree is built to
transfer into public 4-year
colleges like UW, WSU and CWU.



EARN A DEGREE: Running Start students can qualify for 90+ credits over two years

ADDITIONAL COSTS OF ATTENDANCE

- Books/supplies (budget approx. \$100 per class, per quarter)
- Course fees (Lab fees)
- Meals (not provided by the college, but may be purchased on campus)
 SVC has a FREE food pantry for students
- Transportation (SVC students receive a free city bus pass)

Sample Running Start Quarter Costs:

Let's say this Running Start student does not qualify for a fee waiver and is taking 15 credits (English 101, Math 146 and Ceramics 241). Their costs would look a bit like this:

<u>College Fees Lab Fees Book(s) Food/Transportation</u>

\$332.50 + \$40 + \$105 (1, used) + \$600 (\$50/wk, 12 wks) = \$1,077.50

What's it like to be a Running Start student?


A Running Start student is a COLLEGE STUDENT!

- You get to be in charge of your educational path! This is a lot of fun and a responsibility (and you can always get help from SVC advisors and resources).
- Your weekly schedule and the amount of time you spend in class will look a lot different than high school - and you can build your own schedule!
- The conversations you'll have in class will be different than in a high school environment. The average age of SVC students is 29, and everyone has opted in to be here, so the level of engagement tends to be more elevated.
- **SVC offers a wide range of subject matter and activities** that you typically can't find at the high school level.

WHAT IS FERPA?

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act

As a college student, you have the right to privacy in your educational records

and the college is not allowed to share your information without a release.

FERPA is a federal law made to protect student information from being misused.

IT'S A BIG DECISION with BIG RESPONSIBILTIES!

- College environments are faster-paced, have more homework, and require time-management (we can help!).
- Schedules and calendars are different for colleges & high schools: Example: 2023 HS spring break = 4/3 – 4/7, SVC spring break = 3/20 – 4/3 (spring quarter starts on 4/4, so you <u>can't</u> be absent that week)
- Students should be prepared to work closely with college and high school counselors & advisors to pick courses that align with high school graduation requirements (because of FERPA, parents and counselors can't do it for you).

These credits will be on both your high school and college transcript.



SVC RESOURCES – we're here to help!

- First Quarter Experience course You'll enroll in one of our College Success Skills classes and learn what you need to know to be a great college student! You'll also complete an education plan with an SVC advisor.
- SVC faculty are invested in your success!
- Tutoring Center SVC offers in-person and online tutoring for any student that needs it, for any of our courses.
- Math Center
- Writing Center
- Counseling & Advising

In-Person, Online or Hybrid classes?

- In-Person courses are traditional, in-person meetings in classrooms on one of our three campuses (Mount Vernon, Whidbey Island or San Juan). In-person classes meet two - five times per week (this varies by subject matter).
- Online courses are fully online and usually asynchronous (meaning there is no set meeting time for the whole group). You can expect to manage your own time to meet deadlines. There can be group work and online discussions, and you do have access to your faculty during office hours.
- Hybrid courses are in-person with an online (asynchronous) component. There is a time when the group meets, but not for as long as fully in-person courses, as well as online material that students complete on their own.



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WHAT IS PLACEMENT?

Placement means that you're ready to take on <u>college-level</u> coursework in English and Math.

There are **two** main ways we work with Running Start students to establish placement:

- Your High School Transcript: ENGLISH: 3.0 cumulative GPA
 MATH: Algebra 2, for two semesters, B or better in BOTH semesters
- Accuplacer Placement Tool this is available at SVC campus or on Zoom (you can take it multiple times and it is free for SVC applicants)
